The community is equipped in the event of an emergency with a standing backup generator at the waste water plant, two portable pumps for lift stations, one portable generator, one chain saw, a large pay-loader with 2.5 yard bucket/ lift platform,/ reversible plow and forks, a street sweeper, a 2.5 ton dump truck with a reversible plow, two pick-ups (one with lift gate), one jointly owned trench box, three police cars, two ambulances, one grass rig, one boat, two pumper trucks, one rescue unit, two tanker units, one grader with one-way/ v-plow/ wing attachments, one tractor, and one jointly owned Vactor truck.

There are four full-time police officers employed in Welcome, however, they share these officers with the City of Sherburn under the Joint Powers Agreement for Law Enforcement. The city owns one loader tractor, one grader, one dump truck, two pumper trucks, one grass rig, one rescue truck, one street sweeper, one chainsaw, and miscellaneous shop equipment.
